Girls State is run by the American Legion Women's Auxiliary at Eastern CT State University and teaches how government works while developing leadership skills and developing an appreciation of citizen rights. Girls can attend between their junior and senior years and are in residence at ECSU for the week.

Girls State 2012: Laurel Girls State is an annual 6 day event run by the Women's Auxiliary of the American Legion at Eastern Connecticut State University. Years ago our branch became aware that Boys State, also held annually at Eastern Connecticut State University had a much larger attendance than Girls State. We decided to help the Women's Auxiliary recruit High School women between their junior and senior years attend Girls State at the end of June. The program focuses on how government works. The students have opportunities to run for office, and participate in elections. They learn how to write and support bills. Each day State officials come to speak to the students about their jobs. Catherine Sampson our co-President and I were in touch with the Guidance Counselors at Windham High School, Windham Tech, EO Smith, in Mansfield and Coventry High School who were able to find candidates to attend. We are proud to be part of the recruiting and sponsoring process for this wonderful program. Through the years, the number of women attendees has increased.

We were able to recruit five area young women and are hopeful they will be able to attend our September meeting so that we can meet them and hear about their experiences.

The National Conference of College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) - Referred to as nickwhistle: NCCWSL is an annual leadership conference for college students. It is organized and run by our National AAUW and held at the University of Maryland. The conference features awe-inspiring women as speakers and it is hoped that the college students will carry the enthusiasm of the speakers back to their own campuses and use it to further their leadership endeavors.

The Storrs/Willimantic branch helps to recruit and sponsor students from our three area colleges/universities, Quinebaug Valley Community College, Eastern Connecticut State University, and the University of Connecticut. We rotate our sponsorships through the colleges. The Connecticut AAUW also contributes to the sponsorship of the student(s) through a grant for which we apply.

This year the conference was held at the beginning of June. Two students from Quinebaug Valley Community College attended. Our representative from QVCC, Ling-chuan Chu, worked very hard to find students to attend who were willing and available. We thank her for her hard work and time. We are looking forward to having the two women attend a meeting in the fall to tell us about their experiences.

Sue E. Harkness Book Award: During our regular monthly meetings, drawing tickets are sold for the chance to win one of several gifts brought in by the previous month's winners. All of the money collected this way is used for the Susan E. Harkness book award. Each year for many, many years Storrs Willimantic has awarded a female student attending UCONN or ECSU some funds towards the cost of her books. Several years ago, the branch decided to name this book award after Sue E. Harkness because of her dedication to the Educational Foundation (now known as the Educational Then in 2007, shortly after AAUW Opportunities Fund.) opened its doors to people with 2-year degrees, our branch decided to include QVCC in the rotation for the book award. The award is currently for \$200 and is given to a woman who exemplifies deep appreciation for and belief in higher education.

Elizabeth P. Jordan Memorial Scholarship: A new scholarship committee was formed this year consisting of Catherine Sampson, Ling-Chaun Chu, and Terry Brown. The committee developed criteria for applicants and a scholarship

EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES FUND NEWS

AAUW is one of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women, and through its Educational Opportunities Fund, provides 278 fellowships and grants yearly to outstanding women and nonprofit organizations in the United States and around the world.

During the academic 2012-2013 year, more than \$4.3 million is going to a broader community of women in order for them to gain access to educational and economic opportunities - breaking through barriers so that all women have a fair chance. Fellowship and grant recipients perform research in a wide range of disciplines and work to improve their schools and communities. Through them, AAUW is fulfilling its mission of lifelong education, improving the quality of life for all and tackling the educational and social barriers facing women around the globe. Funding comes directly from contributions made by branches and individual members. continues next column The Legal Advocacy Fund, which is a program of the

AAUW Education Opportunities Foundation, supports men and women in the workplace who are faced with discrimination issues, expands campus outreach regarding discrimination, and conducts gender based research projects. It is suggested that each local board donate, an amount that would represent at least \$5 per member, to the LAF. Our contribution came close to meeting the LAF goal.

This year the \$500 Elizabeth P. Jordan Memorial Scholarship was awarded to Jessica Lamey who will begin her Junior Year at UConn in the fall after graduating from Quinebaug Valley Community College this spring.



How We Raise Funds to Support Educational Opportunities Fund (EOF)

The Storrs Willimantic Branch raises funds to support the Educational Opportunities Fund and a couple of ways. AAUW members are offered the opportunity to participate in fundraisers such as a book author event or fashion

show, and the June plant sale at Del Anne's. When AAUW became 100, some members of our branch started a Century Club. To honor and support the strong educational philosophy of AAUW, those members made a donation of \$100 each. Several of our members have continued this practice made this an annual contribution. 100% of all money raised in these ways is sent directly to the Educational Opportunities Fund. So far this year, 2 members of our branch each gave \$100 and we collected \$213 at the June plant sale, for a total of \$413. A general rule of thumb used to gauge how much a branch gives towards the EOF is \$25/member. Since we have nearly 60 members we are about \$900 short of this goal. Anyone interested in contributing to the EOF your contribution is totally tax deductable. Make checks out to AAUW Educational Opportunities Fund and send them to Pamela Thompson, P.O. Box 156, East Killingly, CT 06243 who will fill out the proper forms and send them on to National.

In their own words

Former members share their stories (from 125th anniversary)

I was fascinated by Dad's field - architecture and I wanted to do something in art—I wanted to be a teacher of art. I went to school in New Britain. I had friends who spoke Polish and I taught them English. To be a teacher who really understood their students, to me, that was a special calling.

I taught at UConn - imagine teaching GIs art history! I looked up the places where they had been stationed in the war and found painters from there to incorporate into my lessons. Later, I taught textile design and silk screening. I am proud to say that I was able to help my students realize their own talents. After my husband Ben died, I began to write poetry.

I was the membership chair of AAUW and later took on the role of historian, collecting articles and pictures about the Branch. I am proud to have established the AAUW Woman of the Year award which has recognized so many other wonderful women in our area.

My name is Louise Johnson (1913-2009)

School was a wonderful experience for me—a friendly place where teachers were helpful and compassionate. I guess that's why I always wanted to be a teacher when I grew up. I attended a four-room schoolhouse in Manhattan Beach, a section of Brooklyn, NY. I admired Eleanor Roosevelt very much-she tried to improve life in so many areas.

I considered raising my family my most important job. I taught for awhile but wanted to spend more time with my children. For 20 years, though, I volunteered as a docent at the Benton Museum at UCONN when the program first started.

In my time, I was President of the AAUW branch, President of the Storrs branch of the Hospital's Women's Auxiliary and President of the University League at UConn, where I now serve as Program Chair.

Two highlights of my life are having climbed mountains in Estes Park [Colorado] and becoming a Justice of the Peace and performing a marriage!
